## PHACS CAB EVALUATION SURVEY RESULTS

Megan talked about the PHACS CAB Evaluation Survey results. There were 6 responses. Some suggested topics for upcoming calls are:

- Topics covered at last CAB meetings;
- Retention;
- Disclosure;
- Young adults and adults affected by HIV;
- Safe sex in young gay men; and
- Research summaries.

#### SMARTT HAIR COLLECTION HANDOUT

Julie from Westat talked about the SMARTT hair collection handout. Hair collection was added to the entry visit for babies in the SMARTT Dynamic Cohort. Study staff will ask for permission to collect hair samples from moms and babies. If the hair cannot be collected at the entry visit, it may be taken up until three weeks after the entry visit. The purpose of the hair collection is to measure how much HIV medication was passed to the baby during pregnancy. Monica Gandhi is the researcher who proposed hair collection in PHACS. Hair collection is painless for moms and babies.

Some moms have not felt comfortable allowing their baby's hair to be cut. There may be cultural reasons why moms are uncomfortable. Monica put together a handout for moms. The handout describes the hair collection process. It also explains the purpose. Julie reviewed the handout.

Theresa talked about the handout. Site staff will respect moms' wishes if they do not want to participate in the hair collection. The picture on the flyer is helpful. It shows how much hair is collected. The handout is easy to understand. Some moms might be worried about what researchers are testing for from the hair samples. The flyer needs to make it clear that the researchers are only testing for HIV medication levels, and that they are not allowed to test for anything else without the mom's permission.

Kim talked about the handout. The handout shows moms the purpose of the hair collection. It can help moms understand that they are helping other moms and babies. The handout should stress that there is no pain for the baby or mother.

Juan talked about the handout. It might be more helpful for moms to be able to come back to the clinic for hair collection later. It might be helpful to ask them to come back in six months or a year. The sample could be taken twice in a year. The samples could be compared.

Stephanie talked about the handout. Some African-American families do not cut a baby's hair until the baby's first birthday. The handout should stress that information obtained from the hair analysis will help other moms and babies.
